Secondary students completing the Esthetics pathway will be able to sit for the National Industry Credentialed assessment offered on-line from NOCTI. Once mastery is reached, students will receive recognition for completion and use this credential in conjunction with their job or continuing training. 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Esthetics Pathway Description

Although the pay is good in many of the jobs in Personal Care Services, people choose these jobs because they want to serve others. They are motivated by the need to assist others and to help make someone else's life better. Occupations are many and varied including cosmetologists, estheticians, nail techs, and barbers. These type jobs help people feel and look better. Personal Care Services workers assist individuals with their personal appearance including shampooing, cutting, coloring, and styling hair; giving manicures, pedicures, and scalp and facial treatments; providing makeup analysis; cleaning and styling wigs and hairpieces; and providing personal fitness training. Also, within personal care services, funeral directors and attendants make funeral arrangements for grieving families. Skincare specialists in Georgia (esthetics) cleanse and beautify the face and body to enhance a person's appearance. They usually work in salons, health and beauty spas, or medical offices. Most work full time and work evenings and weekends, especially self-employed workers operating their own salon. Skincare specialists must complete a state-approved program. After completing the program, these specialists must pass a state exam for licensure. Newly hired specialists sometimes receive on-the-job training, especially when working with chemicals. Employment of skincare specialists is expected to grow 25 percent from 2014 to 2024, which is faster than the average for all occupations. The growing number of beauty salons and spas should result in good job opportunities.

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Esthetics

NOTE: Students have many options to **ENTER** and **EXIT** from their academic studies into the workforce. When a student graduates from high school, they are eligible to choose one of many **ENTRANCE POINT** options: **1.** Enroll in either a 2- or 4-year post-secondary program; **2.** Enroll in an apprenticeship program or the military; or **3.** Enter the workforce using technical skills learned in high school. When a student finishes a 2- or 4-year degree program, they may choose to **EXIT** and **1.** Enroll in an apprenticeship program or the military; **2.** Enroll in a professional university degree program; or **3.** Enter the workforce using technical skills learned.
