A summary of Comments: Special education services are inadequately funded Better recognition of dyslexia Training for classroom teachers and administrators in dyslexia help all students read better Because of limited funding and lack of understanding special education programs are denying services or removing them in the short term; everybody loses in the long term Special education services are not extensive or as personalized as they could be Having mental health professionals provide interventions to meet IEP goals Services can be improved by demanding state university systems properly equip future teachers in elementary grades Special education services in Georgia are inconsistent from county to county and from school to school Services can be improved by ensuring that counties are not limiting students based on a diagnosis or label. Inclusion in some way should be a first try. 10:15 - 11:00	DOE Updates	 Break Deborah Gay, Director Special Education Services & Supports Georgia Department of Education Reviewed the membership process for potential applicants – suggest that membership committee write out procedures for selecting SAP members Legislative Updates that impacts education – the governor has not signed any of the education bills to date SB 364 sponsored by Lindsey Tippins amends Chapter 2 of Title 20 of the O.C.O.G Annotated, relating to elementary and secondary education, so as to revise provision relating to annual teacher, principal, and assistant principal evaluations; revise provisions relating to student assessments; mastery of reading by the end of the fifth grade. HB 614 –Videotaping bill sponsored by Valencia Stovall basically says a school system can pilot a program to allow video cameras in self-contained classrooms of special education students. No funds behind bill; directs the Department of Education to work with interested districts. SB 355 – Student protection act provides for
